## Director's Column

The Pinal County Board of Supervisors Public Hearing and adoption of the tentative budget is scheduled for June 26, with final adoption on August 7. The Library District budget is very close to last year's figures. The final payment of \$35,000 on the loan for the online system will be paid in June, getting us out of debt a year earlier than planned. Book allocations have remained the same as last year. The requested budget is as follows:

Personnel	\$229,540
Supplies	\$ 24,150
Books	\$110,000
Outside Services	\$ 54,950
Capital Expenditures	\$ 14,000
PC Technician	\$ 26,000
TOTAL	\$458,640

The Library District has received news that the "Legal Information Access" LSTA grant has been funded in full. This grant proposal requests \$4,700 to cover supplies needed for a retrospective conversion of the Superior Court Law Library holdings to our catalog. The Superior Court Law Library in Florence is uncataloged, not well known, and difficult to find and access by the general public. This project proposes a retrospective conversion of approximately 250 titles, adding those records to the existing Library District

catalog, and to load commonly used legal forms to the library's website, thus making the law library resources much more accessible to the public. The project includes workshops to train library staff in locating and providing effective legal information. We will add the bibliographic record only; item records will be added as needed by Law Library personnel.

The 2002 Library Institute is nearly here! This year's Institute is an advanced program for second or third time participants. The group will meet at the University of Arizona May 20-24 for a full week, featuring Sandra Nelson speaking on "Planning and Managing for Results." This year, we have two participants from Pinal County: Mary Joy Zuik (Apache Junction Public Library), and Delise Christensen (PCLD).

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## Cataloging Corner

The first subject I want to discuss is your item call numbers. Since I do some cataloging of donations for many of you, and some new books for others, I want to remind you that I don't know how each library deals with some of the call number decisions. If I add an item and print a label for your library, and it isn't where or how you want it, feel free to change it in the catalog and print a new call number. This is especially true of Juvenile and Young Adult items. Not being familiar with your patrons, I don't always know the best location for a book.

Now, let's talk about serials. A serial record is a continuing resource issued in a succession of discrete

parts, usually bearing numbering, that has no predetermined conclusion. Examples include journals, magazines, continuing directories, annual reports and monographic series. We can use a serial record that has a starting date but no ending date and add every issue to that record, being careful to put something in the volume section of the item record to let the patron know what edition it is; i.e., a date, edition number, etc. This means that we don't have to add a new record for each year. Some popular serials are the World almanac, Guinness book of world records, Fodor's and Frommers travel books, etc. Some of the ways to recognize a serial record is that in the 300 field there will simply be a "v." for volumes, with no pagination. Since we

don't know how many volumes there will be, it stays that way. Often, the date in the 260 field will have a dash to indicate that we don't know the ending date yet; sometimes there is no date at all. There are also some extra fields that we don't normally see in monographs, such as the 310 field and the 362 field. And if the name changes, a serial record can be closed off and a new one begun for the new title. This is all pretty complicated and all you need to remember is that there are serial records, some of the signs to look for, and how to add your items to them.

Before I finish up, let me add that
