MAMMOTH Spring Lecture Series

We've had a busy spring so far at the Mammoth Public Library. Our spring lecture series included talks on Biosphere 2, the San Manuel Mine and the Camp Grant Massacre.

Linda Leigh, one of the original Biospherians, presented a slide show about her involvement in planning Biosphere 2 and living inside for two years. Leigh pointed out how the lessons learned from the challenges of living in that closed system can provide insight into the current environmental issues we face in our larger closed system—our planet Earth.

Onofre "Taffy" Tafoya, author of *Mother Magma*, regaled us with tales of the San Manuel mine and the dedicated miners who made the river of ore flow there for so many years. Tafoya also shared an array of interesting photos in a display that lined all the walls of the Mammoth Community

Center.

The final presentation in our spring series was given by bookstore owner Evaline Auerbach. Auerbach lives in Oracle and has a passion for the history of the area. Her talk about the Camp Grant Massacre brought to light some of the hidden facts and circumstances of this tragic event. She also discussed the various books that mention (or overlook) the incident.

Linda Leigh also treated us to a "Wormshop" in two parts. The first part was an informative lecture about wonderful worms, what they do and how they do it. We learned that the food scraps we once considered garbage can be magically transformed into nutrient rich plant food by these tiny creatures. Many of the enthusiastic attendees decided then and there to become worm farmers. During part two, we set up our worm bins with the ideal environment for our new red wigglers.



Then we rounded up our worms and toted them home.

We are planning some improvements to the library including finishing up our new teen room. We intend to have it done in time to celebrate with a party that will coincide with the start of the Summer Reading Program. In keeping with this year's Summer Reading theme *Be Creative At Your Library* we will enjoy making crafts, learning about rhythm and music, and lots more!

Cataloging Corner

TITLE STATEMENT

In this issue we will continue to examine the title field. This is the 245 field in your MARC record, and it contains the title of a work and a statement about responsibility for the work. Last time we looked at the three simple subfields; i.e., subfields a: Title, subfield b: subtitle, and subfield c: author, etc. We also looked at the GMD (General Material Designation) in the subfield h (these go in brackets after the subfield a and include things like [sound recordings], [videorecordings], etc.). Now let's venture into some more complicated subfields!

The subfield n is the number of a part or a section. We see these often in graphic novels and some video recordings. Let's look at one:

\$a Bleach. \$nVol. 4 /\$c [story and art by Tite Kubo ; English adaptation, Lance Caselman ; translation, Joe Yamazaki].

This is volume 4 of the graphic novel titled "Bleach". Now, what if this volume 4 has it's own title? That will go in a subfield p.

The subfield p is the name of a part or a section. Let's look at the same 245 field with the title of volume 4 added:

\$a Bleach. \$n Vol. 4, \$p Quincy Archer hates you /\$c[story and art by Tite Kubo ; English adaptation, Lance Caselman ; translation, Joe Yamazaki].

So, volume 4 of Bleach has it's own title of "Quincy Archer hates you". If there were no volume number, then the subfield p would follow the title, but if there is a number, then the subfield n comes first, followed by the subfield p.

Now, what if there is a GMD that goes into this record? We already know that the GMD goes in a subfield h after the title and before any subtitles (which go in subfield b). It seems that the subfields n and p are more important even than the GMD. So, if we have a sound recording of the above title "Bleach volume 4". Here is what it would look like:

\$a Bleach. \$n Vol. 4, \$p Quincy Archer hates you \$h [sound recording] /\$c Tite Kubo ; English adaptation, Lance Casel-

man ; translation, Joe Yamazaki].

I am not going to go into detail about spacing and punctuation, except to say that I have added extra spaces in my examples just to make it easier to read.

Next time I will discuss what to do with that title in the subfield p so that patrons can search using it and find this record.
