

OTHER COUNTY PARK PARTNERSHIP OPPORTUNITIES



Oracle Park is a small neighborhood park encompassing 4.92 acres near Oracle, Arizona. Amenities include restrooms, basketball court, picnic tables and grills, and playground equipment



West Pinal (Kortsen) Park is a 160-acre community park located near the community of Stanfield, Arizona. Amenities include 23 picnic ramadas, six of which include larger BBQ grills. Overnight camping is available for a small fee.

Open Space and Trails Department:

Pinal County residents and visitors are fortunate to have access to a wide variety of park, trail and outdoor recreation opportunities. It is home to 5 State Parks, 4 Wilderness areas, 3 National Monuments, 2 National Forests and a National Scenic Trail.

The County owns and manages several neighborhood/community parks and approximately 60 miles of regional non-motorized multi-use trails.

Pinal County Adopt-A-Park Program



Dudleyville Park is one of a several parks that you can adopt. This park is a 9.94 acre neighborhood park located near Dudleyville, Arizona. Amenities include restrooms, softball/baseball field, picnic ramadas and grills, tot-lot equipment and a basketball court.

ADOPT-A-PARK PROGRAM



The Adopt-A-Park program is a cooperative effort between the Pinal County Open Space and Trails Department and residents, business owners or groups wishing to enhance their community. The program is designed to promote civic responsibility and be fun and educational as well.

Volunteers for the Adopt-A-Park Program can have an enormous impact on the environment and the aesthetic quality of our public spaces. Additionally, the volunteer hours provided by our Adopt-A-Park supporters extends your tax dollars by saving county resources and maintenance costs.

What would you be volunteering for?

- ◆ Meet with Open Space and Trails Department annually to determine current park maintenance priorities.
- ◆ Conduct a minimum of 2 maintenance/clean-up events per year.
- ◆ Notify Open Space and Trails Department of scheduled maintenance events at least 5 days prior to event occurrence.
- ◆ Provide follow-up reports after each park maintenance/clean-up event.
- ◆ Conduct maintenance/clean-up activities in a safe manner.
- ◆ Abide by all park rules and ordinances.
- ◆ Return all supplies, if applicable, upon completing task/duties.
- ◆ Report any hazardous material (e.g. needles, sharp objects, etc).
- ◆ Report all accidents involving injury or equipment damage.
- ◆ Coordinate with Open Space and Trails Department staff to obtain supplies and materials.
- ◆ Place filled trash bags in designated bins.



What would the County be responsible for?

- ◆ Supply trash bags and other needed supplies (as appropriate).
- ◆ Arrange for the removal and disposal of any litter, trash, leaves and material collected from the adopted site.
- ◆ Remove large, sharp or hazardous objects reported by the group.
- ◆ Recognize Adopt-A-Park partners on the County Website.
